Nomination Nuance

In an effort to streamline the election of synod officers at Convention, a new nomination procedure will be implemented for called worker positions on synod boards. The new procedure allows for one nomination ballot sheet (for positions with a seat needing to be filled) to be completed ahead of time so a nomination slate can be presented to the floor, without separate nomination ballots for each position. Nominations will still be allowed from the floor, but the Moderator estimates that a 40% reduction of election-related time will result.

With all of this time saved perhaps the election committee could be expanded to the election and entertainment committee. They could be charged with provided entertainment and exercise opportunities between sessions.

Financial Report

The CLC could use more money to fund our mission opportunities, repair our ILC properties, grant financial aid requests to attend ILC, and pay off our loans on the Academic Center. Etc.

WHILE I SIT


